PIPS Annual Meeting

PIPS is not the only one to have celebrated a "Silver Anniversary" recently. Last year the Archie Carr NWR turned 25 as well! At our meeting this month, conservationist and Renaissance man Vince Lamb will join us to give a presentation on the history of the Carr Refuge, with information gathered for the 25th anniversary celebration of their Refuge last year.

Vince Lamb has served as a permitted turtle scout and walk leader for almost 10 years in the Carr Refuge. He also serves as a Board Member and Treasurer of the Friends of the Carr Refuge. Vince is a nature photographer and Florida Master Naturalist. He and his wife Helga have lived in South Merritt Island since 1973.

Fitting a theme of "If you build it, they will come", the Carr Refuge has become the most important nesting beach worldwide for loggerhead sea turtles and the most important nesting beach in the U.S. for green turtles. Vince's presentation will provide some background information regarding how the Refuge came to be established here. Naming the Refuge for Dr. Carr was a political battle that was won with the help of former Senator Bob Graham.

In addition to the usual presentation at our meeting this month, PIPS current members will be voting for this year's Officers and Directors. We are happy to have two new volunteers who have accepted the nomination to a Director's position on the Board. We do still have vacancies and are always looking for others interested in participating. Terms on the Board are two years and one only need maintain a current membership to qualify and, of course, have the time and interest to be involved.

Sea Turtle Nesting Season Now Underway

March 1st marked the beginning of sea turtle nesting season on our Treasure Coast beaches. Because sea turtles are protected under state and federal laws, human beings are forbidden from "taking, possessing, disturbing, mutilating, destroying, selling and harassing all types of sea turtles, their nests and their eggs." Treasure coast communities also have light restrictions to help protect sea turtle hatchlings which naturally follow the light reflected off the ocean waves by the moon and stars. If they respond to artificial lights and get turned around, they become so disoriented that they head away from the ocean (rather than toward it) and are easily killed by predators (and cars) or die of exhaustion.

Here are a few interesting facts about sea turtles as well as how they fared on our beaches in 2016:

- 1) Loggerheads laid 27,413 nests, shattering the previous record set in 1995 by more than 5000 nests. Since female loggerheads don't lay eggs every year, there should be a smaller number of nests in 2017.
- 2) Since green sea turtles nest every other year and they had low nest numbers in 2016, they should have much higher numbers in 2017. Also, since green turtles are the last of the three varieties to nest on our beaches, many of their nests may have been lost to the erosive beach damage caused by Hurricane Matthew in October of 2016.
- 3) While loggerheads and greens are listed as "threatened" by the federal Endangered Species Act, leatherbacks are listed as "endangered." Leatherback nesting habits are unpredictable and are the least common of the three varieties nesting on our beaches.

2017 PIPS Wildlife Festival Celebrates 25th Year

We were treated to a picture-perfect day on March 18th when we celebrated our annual Wildlife Festival for the 25th year in a row at Riverview Park in Sebastian!

The PIPS headquarters tent was filled with eager buyers of our merchandise, including hats/visors, tee-shirts, hooded sweatshirts, wind shirts, and kids' wear. On the other side of the tent were the raffle/silent auction items. There were 20 raffle items in colorful baskets and gift bags, with a total of 1373 tickets sold. The 6 silent auction items included: a Park Hopper Disney

Suzanne Valencia and her team of volunteers ran the kids' activities tent this year, and what a terrific time everyone had! The Japanese art of Gyotaku was practiced with kids taking a dead fish, painting it in wild and weird colors, and then transferring it to a white tee shirt or tote bag. Shirts and totes were then hung on a clothesline to dry, which created a very colorful display. Making clothespin butterflies and caterpillars and paper plate jellyfish were other activities available to the kids, but Gyotaku won out overall!

Other kids' activities included a Sea Turtle Crawl and Fish Casting. Overall, it was a terrific day for young people to learn about nature and the environment.

The Indian River County Historical Society was well-represented as always. County Historian Ruth Stanbridge likes to remind us that they were participants

in the first PIPS Wildlife Festival which, because of the "storm of the century," ended up with their displays in the Pelican Island Elementary School, instead of Riverview Park! This year, they also teamed up with Old Vero Ice Age, which displayed mastodon and camel bones. Numerous booklets were handed out to the public, including the booklet "One Person...," the Story of Paul Kroegel, and "Our Roads into History," a tour guide to historical and environmental resources in Indian River County.

Three boat tours, conducted by Capt. Hiram's River King were filled to capacity, and many birds were seen nesting on the island. As people left the tours, they offered many positive comments. Many thanks both to Capt. Hiram's and to Mulligan's Restaurant for the use of their boat dock, as the town docks were unavailable as a result of damage from Hurricane Matthew.

As usual, the Photography Contest was very impressive and inspiring, with beautiful works of Mother Nature. Thanks to event organizers Patty Corapi and Vince Lamb and, of course, the photographers who contributed their skills for this great feature of our Festival. We are
