PIPS January Meeting

Our next meeting will be held on Monday, January 25th at 7:00 p.m. at the North Indian River County Library, 1001 Sebastian Blvd. The meeting is open to the public, and light refreshments will be served afterwards.

Our featured speaker for the evening will be Heather Stapleton, Education Director at The Environmental Learning Center, with which she has been associated since 2003. Upon graduation from

Indiana University, she joined the Peace Corps and spent three years in Benin, West Africa, where she created educational opportunities for the children of the village. During that time, she fell in love with travel and environmental education, thus paving the way for her thirteen years with the ELC.

During the summer months, Heather leads turtle walks at the Archie Carr National Wildlife Refuge and also works for the Sea Turtle Conservancy. When not out in nature, Heather can be found singing with local choirs and on stage with the Vero Beach Theater Guild.

Heather will be speaking about the current health of the Indian River Lagoon and how we can all lessen our negative impact on it. The Lagoon is actually an "estuary" and home to Pelican Island, the country's first National Wildlife Refuge. In Indian River County alone, we have over 600 miles of canals and ditches that feed into the Lagoon. Come learn more fascinating facts about this magnificent body of water, the most biologically diverse in all of North America.

Migratory Bird Treaty Centennial 1916-2016

The year 2016 marks the centennial of the Convention between the United States and Great Britain

(for Canada) for the Protection of Migratory Birds (also called the Migratory Bird Treaty), signed on Aug. 16, 1916. The Migratory Bird Treaty, and three others that followed, form the cornerstones of efforts to conserve birds that migrate across international borders.

The Treaty connects the Service with other federal, state, private, non-governmental, tribal, and international partners, who share a long, successful history of conserving, protecting, and managing migratory bird populations and their habitats. Celebrating the centennial of the first Treaty allows us to bring together those who have contributed to its success, and to galvanize efforts to protect migratory birds for the generations to come.

The Migratory Bird Treaty Centennial is more than just a celebration. It is an opportunity to create awareness, promote key actions, increase support, and expand opportunities for engagement in the conservation of migratory birds. It is an occasion to reflect on a century of successful bird and habitat conservation and look ahead to the future of bird conservation.

24th Annual Pelican Island Wildlife Festival

We are again making preparations for our annual PIPS-sponsored Wildlife Festival, to be held on Saturday, March 12th in Riverview Park, Sebastian, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Because the festival's

theme celebrates wildlife, our Arts & Crafts exhibitors as well as non-profit and commercial representatives all have an environmental connection. Admission is free.

This year festival goers will be able to sign up for Pelican Island Pontoon Boat Tours; enjoy center stage presentations about birds of prey and other wildlife; witness the release of a rehabilitated brown pelican; speak with knowledgeable scientists from different wildlife refuges, as well as representatives of local historical societies; watch fishing demonstrations; and buy wildlife-oriented merchandise in the PIPS tent and from various exhibitors. Kids' activities will also include a sea turtle obstacle course. We will feature a photo contest tent in which winners' works may be purchased by means of a silent auction, as well as a separate silent auction and raffle in the PIPS tent.

Overseeing all these events at Center Stage will be none other than our favorite historical re-enactor, Joe Wiegand, as Teddy Roosevelt! Were it not for Roosevelt's setting aside Pelican Island as the country's first conservation site in 1903, our annual celebration would not even be possible, since his edict saved most of Florida's shorebirds. Come and celebrate with us. Feel free to volunteer as well!
